
- This assignment has two main objectives:
 - (1) To give you some practice writing HTML5 markup that contains semantically correct elements and augments the markup with the ARIA landmark roles.
 - (2) To practice applying basic CSS properties to style page layouts. We'll focus on very basic CSS for this first project.



Task 1 For Assignment #1

- I have placed the file named startingcontent.html on the course website and assignment page. Although this file has a .html extension, it contains no markup what so ever. It includes only the textual content of what will be your final webpage.
- This page will not render as it is, since it includes no markup. However, the contents of this file are shown on the next page for illustration purposes only.





Task 1 For Assignment #1

- Your first task in this assignment is to apply HTML5 markup elements to this text in order to produce a page that will render as shown on the next slide.
- Note that at this point, there are no styles applied to the markup content. There are two image files (available on the course website) that appear in the markup, and basic size properties have been applied (see the starting content file).
- When you have completed the markup of the original content, the markup that you have applied should cause the content to render as shown on the next slide.


CSS Restrictions For Assignment #1


- For this assignment you will use only an external stylesheet.

- The markup must contain at least three elements with ARIA roles defined.
- Your markup must pass HTML5 validation and your stylesheet must pass CSS level 3 validation.



When And What To Turn In

- The deliverables for this assignment are:
 - 1. A semantically correct HTML5 markup document without CSS (20 pts). (This is the end result file of task 1.)
 - 2. A semantically correct HTML5 markup document containing ARIA landmark roles with a link to an external style sheet (30 pts). (This is the end result file of task 2.)
 - 3. The CSS external stylesheet (20 pts).
 - 4. A document containing screen captures for both HTML5 documents (without and with CSS applied) validation that shows only the one warning as shown on the next page and CSS validation (all three must be passing!). Make sure that the name of the validated file appears in the screen shots. (20 pts)
 - 5. A screen shot of your final rendered document. (10 pts)
